Brief background	 Austerity measures have been implemented since 2012, with the National Treasury arguing that there are no alternatives, and taxation has reached its limits. These measures have contributed to the rise in debt and poor growth, while there are growing demands on the budget, including for climate financing, gender and care financing, and funding public services. Taxation is one of the effective ways to raise revenues for these demands. The recent budget impasse and the reversal of the VAT hike have thrown into sharp focus the need for a more detailed understanding of potential revenue streams, their revenue potential, and impact on the economy. There is an increasing need for innovative, progressive revenue-raising measures rather than tax measures that disproportionately harm the poor and low-income earners, such as the reversed VAT and eventual fuel levy increase. The IEJ has proposed some progressive alternatives to austerity, including measures to raise revenue and support social and economic priorities.

	 IEJ proposals include removing ineffective tax rebates and incentives, implementing a net wealth tax, and improving taxes on income from wealth, and measures beyond tax, such as utilsiing funds within the Gold and Foreign Exchange Contingency Reserve Account (GFECRA). There is a need to model, quantify, and/or explore new revenue proposals and their impact on the economy.

Policy brief	 A policy brief should be written from the content developed in the working paper. The purpose of this brief is to: Provide a high-level summary and overview of the key proposals in the working paper and their feasibility. Share key policy recommendations from the working paper's research findings for policymakers and civil society organisations.
Opinion piece	The op-ed will be written in a clear and simple language for one of South Africa's media houses/publications to share the research findings with the general public.
